# Minutes for September 18th, 2025 Garden Club Meeting

The meeting was held at the Eagles Hall in Ladysmith on September 18, 2025 with 54 members attending and 8 guests. This was our first meeting back after the summer. Doors opened at 6:15 pm for set up. Our greeter for the evening was Linda W.

Carol Henderson opened the meeting at 6:50 pm and welcomed all members and guests attending. She mentioned whom our speaker would be Natalie Edmond from Dinter's Nursery.

Carol had heard from Starla Parkin our Treasurer whom had an accident this summer shortly after we had our pig roast at the end of June. Starla won't be able to continue on being the Treasurer as she will take the time to recuperate and heal after her accident. We are all hoping for her to have a full recovery and be able to continue her very active lifestyle shortly. We are hoping to have a small group of members to go out to Starla's when her dahlia tubers need to be dug up in October.

- Elections will be next month and so members can think about putting up their name for one of the positions or mention a good candidate for a position. The positions are: President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer and alternates where possible.
- Lots of thanks goes to the ladies that look after the Little Sales Table and Library and Seed Exchange. (Linda W., Margo and Cathy) Check the tables out and remember the seeds are free. And if you have seeds at home bring them in for exchange.
- Carol was mentioning that approximately 120 lbs of grapes were picked at her place from the Food Share Group. (Ladysmith Resource Centre) Shannon and Tom look after this program. They have volunteers come out to pick the fruit and then 1/3 of it goes to the owners, 1/3 to the volunteers and 1/3 to the Food bank.

We will finish the business part of the meeting right after the coffee/tea break. Carol called on Bennye Miller to introduce the speaker for the evening. **Bennye welcomed Natalie Edmond who will speak on Propagation**. She gave us a little background on Natalie's horticulture experience. She received her Landscape Horticulture Certificate in 2019. And achieved her Red Seal in Landscape in Horticulture in 2023. Now she is the production supervisor at Dinter Nursery in Duncan.

- Natalie gave us all a very detailed briefing on the basics of Propagation and Division. She started out about telling us the basic tools you need such as a knife, grafting knife, rubbing alcohol, rooting hormones and a plastic bag. A dome is preferable as the plant will need a humid environment for the first while. Bottom heat is important as it will get the cuttings to root out faster and make sure to keep the roots moist but not saturated.
- Your propagation soil should be a light mix with vermiculite. She gave us a detailed outline on your softwood which is plants in the springtime, semi softwood which is

**summer time and then the autumn is the hard wood**. Best time to take cuttings is in the early morning.

- She gave us a demonstration on a willow plant she had brought in to show members on how this can work to do an angled cut and take the leaves off. It did take her a bit of cutting to get the root system a part. A few things she mentioned on this was to prepare soil, groom the leaves, use rooting hormone, and make sure to label your developing roots.
- She did give us a power point demonstration on how this can work when you do your planting. It all looked easy enough but now the question is will it work! It can easily take up to 4- 6 months to see progress, be patient.

Carol thanked Natalie for giving us this detailed presentation on propagation. She will be around to answer more questions through our coffee break.

Carol resumed the meeting at this time. Susan has eggs for sale tonight if members are interested in buying a dozen - \$7.50

- ➤ We have some decisions to make on Queens Park. Jennifer, Joanne and Michele have been faithfully looking after the park and watering in the summers. The hoses have been heavy to move. Jennifer and Joanne have had some changes in their lives and will no longer be able to do this. Unless there are volunteers whom are willing to take this on, the club will have to notify Park Board that we will no longer look after this.
- A big thank you to all the volunteers that have put their name down for a job from manning the Little Sales Table to making the snacks for coffee time. Thanks to Barb and Mi for always having the coffee and tea available for the meeting night. Thanks to Lynne for putting out the Snippets each month. This club could not thrive without all the members that volunteer for these positions. The volunteer sheet will be coming around this evening for jobs available for this year. # Linda Brooyman & Niki Toxopeus (NALT)

Linda will share about NALT's Pollinator Paradise project, the habitat needs of different pollinators, and how you can ensure your garden is a pollinator paradise. She will focus specifically on the benefits of native plants for native pollinators, the importance of habitat

connectivity, and the diversity of pollinators that the project has recorded at particular native flowering plants.

Linda started working with NALT in 2020. She has a Masters degree in anthropology, having worked with First Nations in Deline NWT and Waswanipi Quebec on traditional ecological knowledge and scientific collaboration. Through this she has learned that experience on the land, or 'in Nature' is the best way to develop and maintain an ethic of care and stewardship for everything from our forests,



streams and meadows to our parking lots and boulevards. This is why she works to develop and promote stewardship projects in which all community members can participate.

#### **RECIPES**

### Margot's Mango Lime Loaf

325 degree oven Middle oven rack

2 c. all purpose flour

1/2 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. baking powder

1/2 tsp. baking soda

2 large eggs, at room temp.

1 cup granulated sugar

1 Tbsp. lime zest

3 Tbsp. lime juice

3/4 cup neutral vegetable oil

1 cup plain whole milk (not low fat) Greek yogurt

1 tsp. vanilla extract

1 cup diced fresh mango (1/2") pieces

- 1. Coat a 9"x5" loaf pan lightly with oil. Line with parch ment paper with long side overhanging edges of pan to lift loaf out of pan when baked.
- 2. In a large bowl, whisk together the flour, baking soda, baking powder and salt.
- 3. In a separate bowl, add eggs, sugar, lime zest and juice, oil, yogurt and vanilla. Whisk until smooth.
- 4. Combine the wet and dry ingredients together. IMPORTANT Do NOT overmix. There should be the odd dry patch in the batter. Add the mango and gently fold into the batter. Pour into the loaf pan, spreading evenly and bake for approximately one hour. Use a cake tester to determine doneness. Cool on a rack for 30 mins.
- 5. Using the overhanging parchment paper, gently lift loaf out of pan and continue to cool on rack.
- 6. You may glaze the loaf with the following but I personally find it too sweet so I omit. If you decide to glaze the loaf, wait until it is completely cooled.

#### Glaze

1/2 cup powdered sugar

1 tsp. lime zest

1-2 tbsp. Lime juice

1 tsp. Milk or cream

1. Whisk the above ingredients and drizzle over completely cooled loaf. Chill to set glaze.

# **Ginger Garlic Green Bean**

Preparation time: 10 minutes Cooking time: 3 to 4 minutes Makes: four servings

1/2 pound green beans, trimmed, & cut in half, widthwise

1 Tbsp vegetable oil

2 tsp finely chopped ginger

1 medium garlic clove, minced

2 tsp honey

2 tsp lime juice

salt & black pepper, to taste

1. Bring a small pot of water to a boil over medium-high heat. Add the green beans & blanch them two minutes. Drain the beans well, cool in ice-cold water, & then drain well again.

2. Place oil in a large skillet set over medium-high heat. Add the blanched beans, ginger, garlic, honey & lime juice and cook, stir one to two minutes, or until beans are piping hot. Remove skillet from the heat, season beans with salt and pepper, and then serve.
